Evaluating a website

Anyone can publish on the internet. You want to make sure the websites you're using for your assignments were created by experts and not by someone who knows absolutely nothing about the topic.

Remember to ask these questions before you use the information in a website, they will help you evaluate it for its trustworthiness.

Who?

Who is the author, publisher or company behind the website?

Are they an expert in the topic?

Is there contact information or other information about the author? (eg. their qualifications)

Does the URL end in .edu (educational) or .gov (government)?

What?

What topics are covered?

Is the information too easy for you or too hard for you?

Is there too much or too little information?

Is the information what you need?

Is the website easy to use? Do the links work?

Have you looked at a range of sources before deciding which is the best one for you to use?

Where?

Does the author say where they got their information from?

Is the information supported by evidence? (statistics, sources etc)

Are the spelling and grammar correct? Are there typos?

Is there a reference list? Has the information been edited?

Does it go against conventional knowledge and research?

Does the information agree with information you've found in other sources?

When?

When was it published?

Has it been revised or updated?

If it's an old website, is it still useful to you?

Why?

Who is the intended audience?

What is the purpose of the website? (Inform? Sell something? Persuade you of something? Entertainment?) Is it obvious?

Is the language intended to get an emotional reaction from you?

Does the point of view seem impartial and objective, or does it take sides?

What is the bias? Just because a website is biased doesn't mean it can't be useful to you, but you must be aware of what the bias is.

Does it make claims that sound too outlandish to be true?
